Visitors Can Watch 1962 Corvette Get Restored: It's been 3 years since the sinkhole opened up inside the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green. Eight Corvettes fell into the more than 30-foot sinkhole. Five of the Corvettes were damaged beyond repair, and so far, a 2009 ZR1 Blue Devil was restored, as well as the 1994 "One Millionth" Corvette. And now, the last of the three to be restored, the 1962 Corvette, was removed from the museum display and transferred to a garage where it will undergo the restoration. The work will be performed in the museum and guests will be able to watch the progress. It needs about \$15,000 worth of new parts, a complete front end assembly, hood panel, and windshield. Thanks to General Motors, all \$25,000 in restoration expenses have been recovered.

OOPS...The driver of this vehicle transporter certainly did not have a good day on the job. The trailer, loaded with brand new C7 Corvette Stingrays and Z06s, was involved in a bizarre wreck involving another semi in Alabama.



It's "bizarre" because, as the original report points out, it left the semi that was not carrying Corvettes with a large tear down the side and the Corvettes on the transporter in really bad shape. It looks as if the two trucks collided in a merge of some sort. The Corvettes at the rear got it the worst, with two of them nearly ripped in half. The top car at the rear of the vehicle transporter also collapsed on top of the bottom car after the transporter's structure likely gave way. It's not a pretty picture, to say the least. Thankfully, no one was hurt in this freak accident, but the Corvettes heading to new homes have likely seen better days.

For all you Corvette enthusiasts out there who have always wished you could take the whole family in your Corvette, here's your answer.

What is claimed to be the only surviving four-door production 1979 Corvette America (not to be confused with the Corvette parts company of the same name) is up for sale on eBay, with the bid

climbing to \$12,650. The seller claims that Chevy actually planned on annually producing 40 of these Corvette America cars, to be built by California Custom Coach in Pasadena. There was a lot of overhead in building these cars since each required cutting two cars in half and mating them together to extend the wheelbase by 30 inches, enabling installation of four seats, four doors, and four T-tops. For some reason, the idea never took off, probably because a base Corvette sold for about \$13,000 back then so the outrageous \$35,000 asking price of the Corvette America made it economically unfeasible.

In all, a prototype and five other Corvette Americas were produced before Chevrolet pulled the plug on the project, according to the seller, who claims that his is the only one believed to have survived until today.

He also claims that one of the Corvette Americas sold for \$500,000 five years ago, (though there is no evidence of the sale on the Internet), and that another one was on eBay for \$300,000 six months ago. He's offering his at the "Buy It Now" price of \$60,000. Not sure who might pay that kind of price, but the car is kind of interesting, as an oddity. The seller notes that there are no exterior door latches on the customized doors, and you unlatch the doors electronically by punching in a code on the keypad on the driver-side windshield by the A-pillar. He also points out that the car has a rear opening

hatchback that was a preview of the actual 1982 Corvette. The seller says he has all paperwork and documents from the factory in Pasadena and that the car is complete with original blue plates and documents. Do we have any takers on this one?
